Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America

75% reduction in new
HIV infections by 2025

90% reduction by 2030

- **Announced by President Trump on February 5, 2019**
- **Collaboration of Health and Human Services agencies**
 - Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health (lead agency)
 - Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
 - Health Resources and Services Administration
 - Indian Health Service
 - National Institutes of Health
 - Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration
- **Key Strategies:**
 - **Diagnose** people with HIV
 - **Treat** HIV rapidly and effectively (goal: viral suppression)
 - **Prevent** new HIV transmissions (PrEP, syringe service programs, etc.)
 - **Respond** quickly to potential HIV outbreaks



Our Strategy

- **New Haven Part A Program was one of ten jurisdictions nationally to be awarded funding**
- Grant provided by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), HIV/AIDS Bureau
- Ryan White Part A Program Regions: New Haven, Waterbury, Bridgeport, Stamford/Norwalk and Danbury
- Hartford Part A Program accepted an invitation to collaborate
- “Ground up” inclusive planning approach
- Plan will establish Region-specific objectives and activities
- Collaborative Research contracted to coordinate planning activities and complete the final plan
- **Plan due to HRSA by June 30, 2021**

Guiding Principles for Local Planning

- **Aspirational:** We can end the local HIV epidemic!
- **Collaborative:** Region-specific input from persons living with HIV (PLWH), stakeholders, planning body members, CBO staff, etc. – **all participants are equals**
- **Data-Driven:** Guided by national data, local data, personal knowledge and expertise, and PLWH experience – **each have merit**
- **Needs-Based:** “This is what needs to be done,” not “This is what’s funded to be done”
- **Goal-Oriented:** High-impact, defined performance expectations
- **Challenges the Status Quo:** Innovative, thoughtful strategies with public, private, programmatic and governmental responsibilities

Planning Timeline

May to August 2020

- Stakeholder Engagement
- Assessment of Current Continuum of Care



September 2020 to February 2021

- Engagement of Priority Populations
- Regional Plan Development



March to June 2021

- Jurisdictional Plan Development
- Final Plan Completed by June 30, 2021



Completed Activities

- **Priority populations:** Young Black and Hispanic Men who have Sex with Men, Black and Transgender women
- **Analysis of the priorities and strategies** of 25 other state and jurisdictional Ending the HIV Epidemic plans
- **Partnerships with LGBTQ+ organizations** to conduct listening sessions with priority populations
- **Collaboration** with the Connecticut HIV Planning Consortium (CHPC) Getting to Zero (G2Z) Sub-Committee

Completed Activities

- **Interviewed more than 30 regional stakeholders, identifying common themes and priorities:**

Service Delivery

- Improve service delivery to priority populations
- Expand the of HIV system of care/new HIV providers
- Coordinate planning among regions
- Train care providers on LGBTQ+ health needs (a gateway to HIV prevention)
- Improvements to the quality of HIV care services
- Improve relationships among stakeholders, providers and health departments

Education and Awareness

- Increase the knowledge of HIV prevention among priority populations
- Education the general public and medical providers on HIV prevention and care
- Increase community engagement in HIV issues
- Educate LGBTQ+ people about their unique health care needs

Disruptive Innovation

- Implement proven innovations (Rapid Start, Self-Test Kits)
- Expand PrEP/PEP use among priority populations
- Increase social media/marketing
- Promote better HIV data collection, sharing and use

Infrastructure Changes

- Diversify and increase funding
- Evaluate policy revision at the local and national level

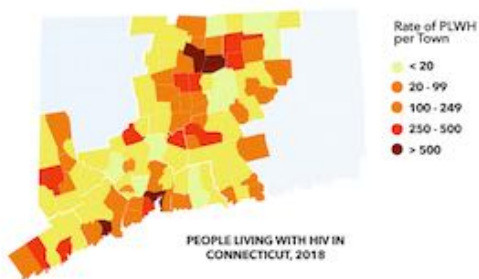

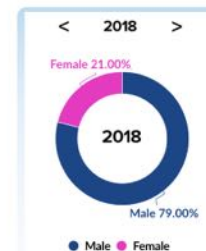

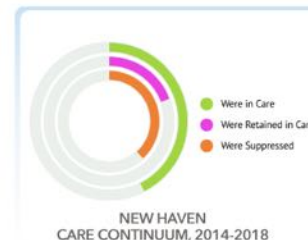
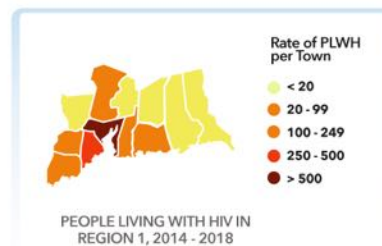

HIV TRANSMISSIONS BY YEAR OF DIAGNOSES AND AGE GROUP

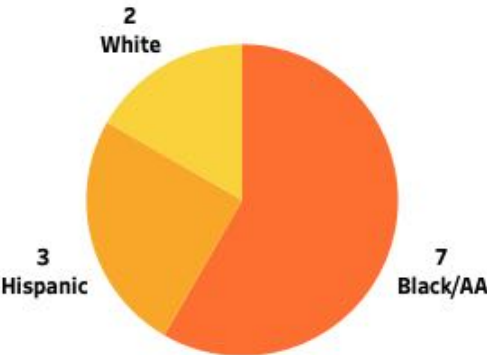

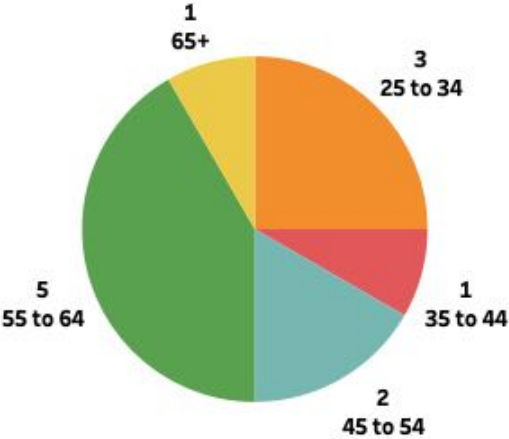

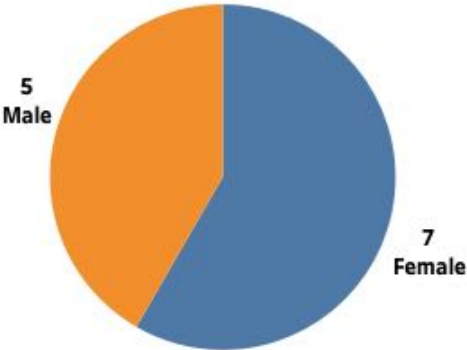
Race by Risk Factor



Age by Risk Factor

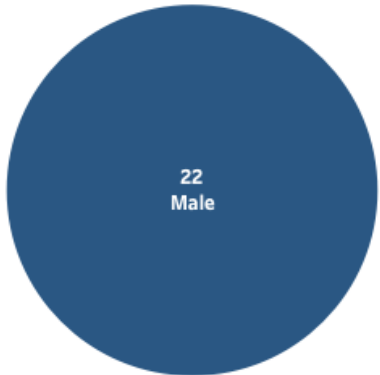
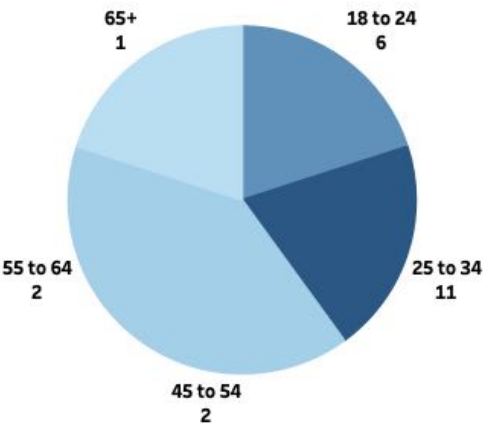
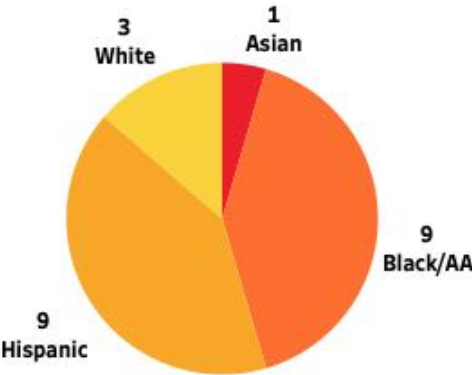


Gender by Risk Factor



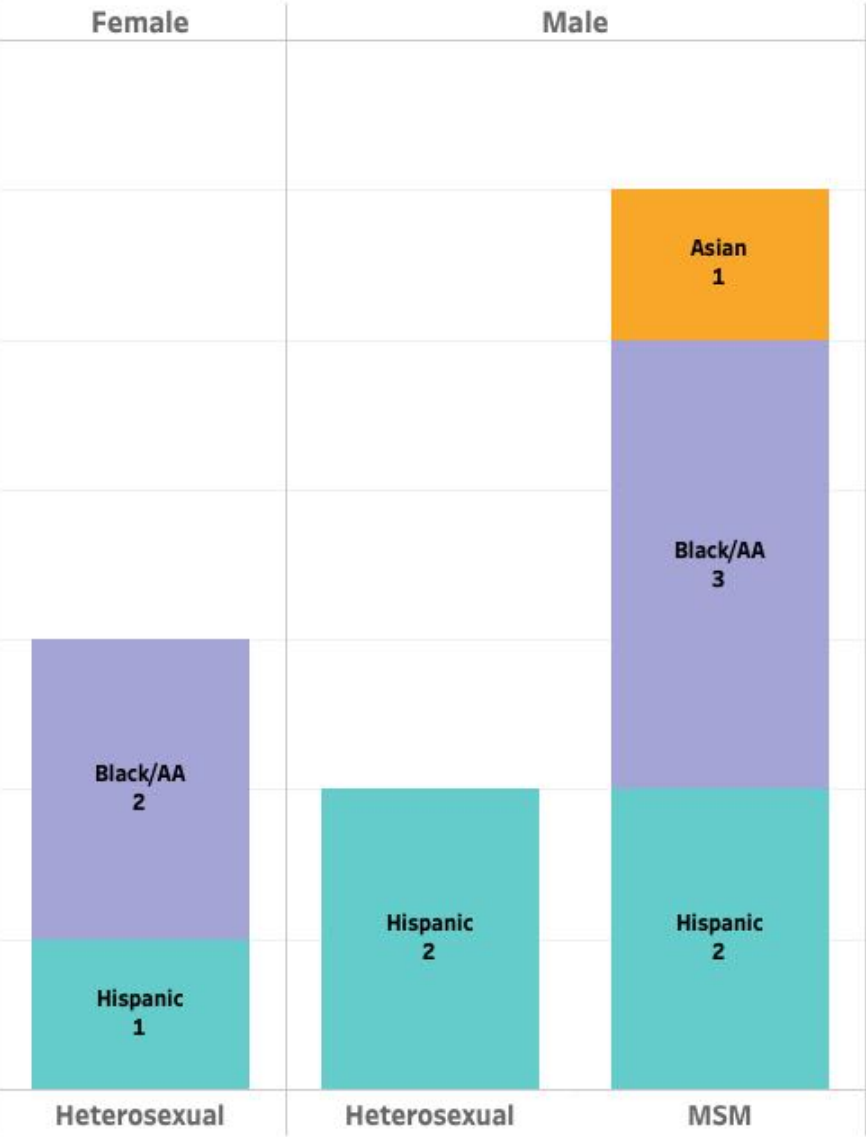
Heterosexual

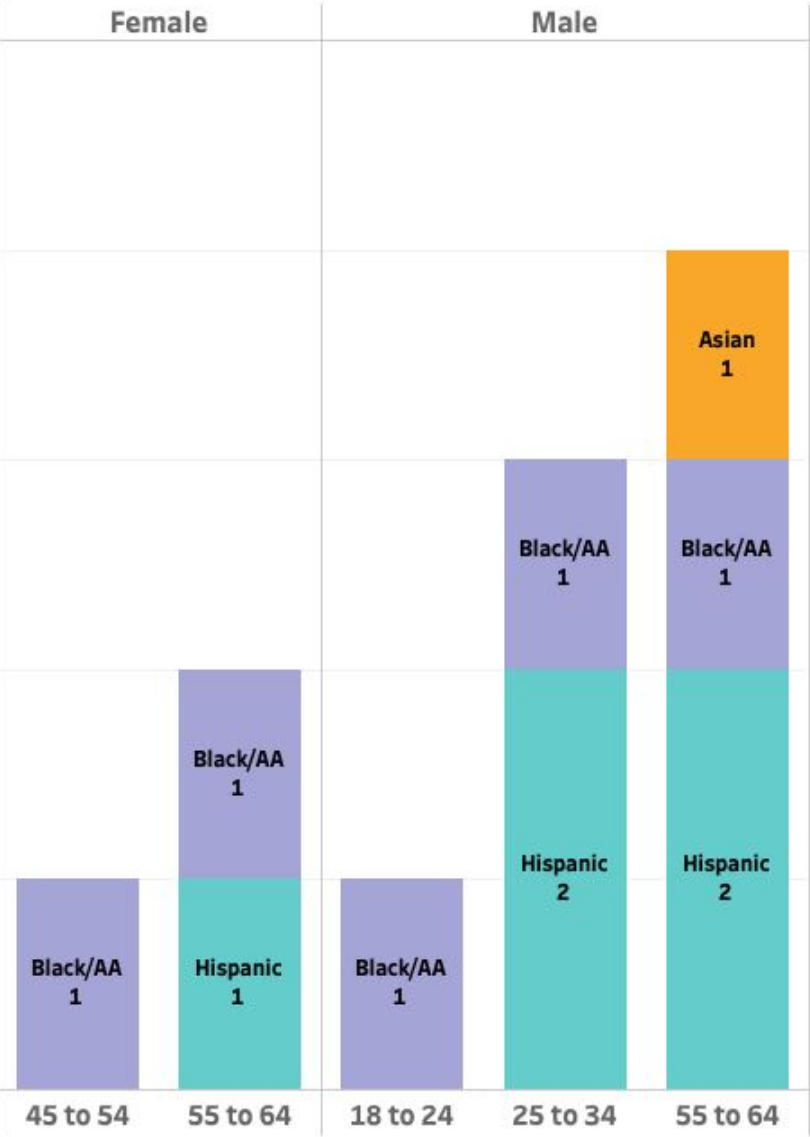
